## **Chairman's Report**

Welcome to the Spring Newsletter. You will find in the newsletter updates from Churchtown Flood Action Group and Churchtown in Bloom.

Kirkland Parish Council was pleased to see that the promised upgrading of the drain gullies on The Avenue and Ainspool Lane were completed in the Autumn and the resurfacing on The Green and by the Horns Inn has also taken place.



Despite the 30 mph roundels at either end of the village, and the regular appearance of a speeding enforcement van, many vehicles continue to speed along The Avenue. The Parish Council is considering what other options there could be to slow the traffic including the possibility of cycle lanes.

It was good to hear at a recent meeting of the Upper and Mid Wyre Asset Management Project that over £200,000 has been spent on refurbishments and improvements to the Garstang Flood Barrier which is now over 30 years old. The improvements include renewing and updating the hydraulic lines as well as putting back-up hydraulic power in place. A spare hydraulic cylinder is also now available in case of failure. The operation of the barrier has also been moved above ground so that the operators can now see the river when operating the barrier. This work is seen as a short term measure as the Environment Agency recognises the Garstang Barrier design is now out of date and is putting together a plan to have a new long term solution developed within the next three years.

You will find in the newsletter detail of the Kirkland Parish Council precept which this year sees a small reduction for households. Our finances are in a healthy position and we plan to use reserves this year to continue to support local community projects, including Churchtown in Bloom. Other ideas for community projects are always welcome. Please contact any of your parish councillors to discuss.

## **Churchtown Flood Action Group**

The Flood Action Group has achieved a great deal since its inception by Siriol Hogg after Storm Desmond in December 2015.

However, its greatest achievement is the recent completion of the Kirkland Embankment at the eastern end of the village adjacent to the junction of The Avenue with the A6. The

Churchtown Flood Action Group are the only community group in the UK to have built their own Flood Embankment – this type of structure is normally only built by statutory agencies.



The group acknowledge that without Roger Weatherell OBE, a civil engineer with vast international experience; who happened to move into the village just prior to Storm Desmond; without Roger being in the village the embankment would have taken much longer. From an original idea by Jim Kippax and John Bracken, who have spent all their lives living alongside the River Wyre, Roger managed the project through the complex procedures required to get the idea off the ground.

The Embankment will be officially opened on 22<sup>nd</sup> August 2019 (the anniversary of the 2016 flood).

Their achievements are now being regarded nationally as a case study for other flood affected communities and what can be achieved.

## Kirkland Parish Precept

Each year a sum of money called the parish precept is collected through your council tax. In simple terms this is calculated by subtracting what the Parish Council will receive in income: from the amount it needs to spend in Kirkland Parish. This money is invested back into your neighbourhood by the Parish Council to improve facilities and services for you and your neighbours. Kirkland Parish Council also applies for grants to fund projects in the Parish.



Band D household should pay £76.31, which amounts to £1.46 per week.

This is a reduction of £12.71 or 24 pence per week.

## Kirkland Memorial Hall - Sponsored Walk

The reinstatement of the Memorial Hall following Storm Desmond also provided an opportunity to modernise and improve the Hall. Not all the work was covered by the insurance claim and as a consequence reserves were dipped into to complete the refurbishment.

To raise funds for the Memorial Hall a Sponsored Walk is to be held. The Memorial Hall invites the local community to participate in this inaugural sponsored walk of approximately 5.5 miles on Saturday 30<sup>th</sup> March at 10.00 am.

The walk is an easy, largely flat, circular route starting at the Memorial Hall, taking in the canal before returning via Many Pads Footpath and Kirkland Hall Farm returning to the Hall where refreshments will be served.

## New Parish Lengthsman

There's a new man who will be taking care of our parish, employed by Kirkland Parish Council to keep up with the maintenance of Churchtown, the A6, Longmoor Lane and into Humblescough Lane, as this is the extent of the Kirkland Parish. Jonathon is shadowing Tim until the end of February; when he takes over this responsibility. The Councillors hope residents will make him feel welcome as he cleans up litter, cuts back grass verges on the A6, clears gullies on Longmoor Lane, plus the myriad other jobs which keeps our community standards so high.

## The St. Helen's Church Shop and Café

A very big thank you to everyone who has supported this venture in the past year! In 2018 the Churchtown Guild CIC (the trading arm of St. Helen's Church) turned over £12,590.73 and raised £3,102.54 for church funds.



This year we will continue to improve the Community Picnic Area and Playing Field behind the Parish Rooms. On Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> March we will be having a "Field Day" when we will be planting 32m of hedging (awarded by the Woodland Trust), as well as 10 fruit trees and 8 fruit bushes. This will be along the side and back fences. If you would like to help out, please do come along on the day - everyone welcome!

In addition, this year the "Hearse House" (next to the church's main gate) will be converted into a permanent village shop. Hopefully the building work will be completed by the 3<sup>rd</sup> weekend in August when we will be holding a Beer & Cider Festival on the Community Field. This is an attempt to revive the tradition of "Church Ales", which were a popular way of raising church funds in medieval "Merry England". If you could spare an hour or two to pull some pints, please speak to me in the café - you will be paid in free beer/cider!
